COURSE DESCRIPTION AND OBJECTIVES

This is the FIRST course of a three part beginning series at the University of Florida, which covers chapters 1-14 of Wheelock's Latin and aims to introduce students to basic vocabulary, grammar, and syntax rules of the Latin Language. More specifically, students will become acquainted with the inflectional patterns of Latin and will be able to recognize different forms of declensions and conjugations. They will concurrently acquire, from the beginning, a rich vocabulary, which will constitute an introduction to Roman culture, as well as an aid in memorization and familiarization with the grammatical structures of the Latin language. Henceforth, students will leave this class having practiced in the translation of words, phrases, and sentences from Latin to English and English to Latin, having learned to pay attention to the details and prepared to succeed in Latin 2.

ACTIVITIES

1. Written exercises both in class and assigned as homework will reinforce the understanding of the inflectional patterns of Latin and aid in memorization. Students will have regular practice reading Latin, translating Latin into English, and composing Latin sentences. These activities will improve the students' awareness of both languages and strengthen their familiarity with the mechanisms of the Latin language.

2. Oral drill and recitation will establish proper pronunciation.

3. Quizzes and exams will ensure that students memorize vocabulary, declensions, and conjugations, and that they understand how to put these elements together in smooth translation.
