Course Description

Do leaders make ethical policy decisions? What are the factors that influence corruption and scandal? Are political policies *ethical?* This course is designed to introduce students to public policy, ethics, and leadership. The first part of the course takes a philosophical approach where we discuss the relationship between public policy and morality—focusing on the criteria to assess policies. We will also discuss whether political policies satisfy moral standards. The second half of the course focuses on public leadership and the role of ethics in political decision-making. We will explore corruption and scandal, leadership, political power, and ethics in the legislative process. Throughout the semester, we will "bring philosophical reasoning to bear on a series of highly important policy areas" (Wolff 2020, 6).

Course Objectives

- address a framework to assess contemporary public policies including benefit, effectiveness, fairness, fidelity, and legitimacy (Welch 2014)
- discuss unethical conduct, corruption, and scandal
- focus on how leadership decisions influence policymaking
- examine the "unrealistic and contradictory expectations from the public about how politicians should behave" (Medvic 2013)

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Basic Course Communication Information

Graded Work Description

- 1. Writing Assignments: 50%. There are 10 writing assignments. Collectively, the writing assignments are worth 50% of your final grade in the course. These assignments are critical thinking assignments where you will address/answer a writing prompt. You are required to engage with the course materials and critically analyze the content. Writing assignments are 1-page and single-spaced.
- 2. Quality Check Assignments: 40%. There are 4 quality check assignments. These assignments are similar to the writing assignment with one major exception: quality check assignments are 2-pages and single-spaced.
- 3. Attendance and Participation: 10%. Discussion requirements are twofold: (1) discussion participation and (2) discussion summary file upload to Canvas. You are expected to participate in class discussions. Discussions will be on Fridays during the scheduled course time via Zoom breakout rooms. Before starting the discussion, I will provide groups with a prompt/question that you will answer. During/after the discussion, you will upload a discussion summary to

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Canvas. Overall, you should demonstrate that you have participated in the discussion by including a summary of the discussion talking points and/or questions that your group addressed.

<u>Attendance</u>: Class attendance is required and expected. You will need to fulfill your commitment and obligation to be in class and on time every day that class is held. Excused absences are subject to my discretion and based on university criteria of excused absences.

Participation: Consistent informed, thoughtful, and considerate class participation is expected. Participation grades are based on your overall contribution to the class. The participation portion of your grade for this class will be calculated on the basis of your attendance and your participation during scheduled course times/ activities. You will satisfy this requirement through your participation through video and audio presence on Zoom. You may also fulfill this requirement in certain instances through written comments in chat and discussion assignments in Canvas [if audio and visual participation is problematic]. If you cannot participate via audio/visual mechanisms during class discussion, please inform me immediately. I will work with you to come up with a solution.

Note: There will be no in-person section on Fridays. We will all engage in virtual discussion groups (via Zoom). I made this decision because I believe it to be the most conducive to student learning and engagement.

Grading Policies and Grading Scale

Policy on Late and Make-up Work: Late work is not accepted. If you find yourself unable to complete your assignments on time, email me before the assignment is due.
